From the publisher: "With the 1920s came an unprecedented time of new found freedoms, as well as a new species of artist-photographer. Albert Arthur Allen was a San Francisco Bay Area photographer who operated outside the margins of the fine art community by specializing in studies that featured full frontal nudity. His images of women, which epitomize kitsch, are more familiar than his name, regularly appearing on posters and postcards. While the average American woman in the 1920s was adjusting to the new freedoms permitted to her sex and acclimating to fashions that flashed more flesh, such as shorter dresses and lower neck lines, Allens women were nude. They audaciously reveal themselves, engaging the unblinking male gaze with a titillating directness. However, nudity evoked...



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
